aideep Mehrotra may be a successful and famous artist now, but easy for the determined Indian painter.

Today Jaideep's work, which is on display this week at 1x1 Art Space in Dubai, sells for thousands of dirhams but there was a time when he was unable to afford basic equipment or go to art school.
